Seminar "Access to Land and Agroecology: Experiences of EU Countries for Ukraine"



The full-scale russian invasion of Ukraine on February 24, 2022, severely disrupted food production and trade, jeopardizing both Ukraine's and the world's food security. Targeted attacks on Ukrainian agriculture have seriously hampered the agrarian sector's functionality. While export-oriented agribusinesses experienced the most significant losses, particularly at the war's outset, family farms and households demonstrated resilience by adapting to extreme conditions and continuing to supply food for the Ukrainian army and civilian population.

The invasion coincided with a pivotal land reform initiative aimed at lifting the moratorium on the sale of agricultural land, which had been in place since 2001. The war has resulted in a reduction of Ukraine's land resources by at least one-third. Despite appeals from researchers, non-governmental organizations, farmers, and peasants to halt land sales during wartime, the government proceeded with land privatization policies. These changes allowed private ownership not only by individuals but also by legal entities, increasing the maximum permissible ownership from 100 hectares to 10,000 hectares per entity.

The war has also caused severe damage to the quality of agricultural land. Hostilities have led to the destruction of soil structure and its essential functions, resulting in a sharp decline in biodiversity. The devastation of vegetation, disruption of topsoil, lack of natural moisture, and desertification pose long-term risks to agricultural productivity and food security.

Despite the challenges of war, Ukraine remains committed to European integration. In June 2024, Ukraine fully initiated the negotiation process for EU accession and is currently working with the EU to identify and address legislative and policy gaps necessary for alignment with European standards. In this context, the government must reevaluate agricultural and rural development policies to ensure synergy with EU practices. Considering European values and the substantial war-induced losses in rural production and human potential, Ukraine's integration into the EU necessitates a shift away from the expansion of intensive monoculture farming. Instead, it should prioritize agroecological approaches that promote sustainable agricultural practices and facilitate the natural regeneration of farmland.

These issues and others will be explored by Ukrainian and European experts, researchers, and practitioners at the seminar titled "Access to Land and Agroecology: EU Countries' Experience for Ukraine". The seminar is supported by the State Organization "Institute for Economics and Forecasting of the National Academy of Sciences of Ukraine" and the EU Erasmus+ program as part of the project "Upskilling Pathway for Agroecology Practitioners toward European Synergies on Land Use" (UPSOL).
